## Reflection

# THE IRON HORSE - (cf. LUKE 12:4)



One of the greatest coaches in modern sports history, John Wooden, who led his UCLA Bruins to ten National titles in a 12 year span, once wrote that: "Sports do not build character. They reveal it".

Born on the 19th of June, 1903, in Yorkville, Manhattan in New York, Henry Louis "Lou" Gehrig rose from being a child of German immigrant parents to one of America's greatest and most loved sporting heroes. Together with his team mate Babe Ruth, Gehrig helped establish the New York Yankees as one of the world's most well-known and successful sporting franchises. A talented hitter, Gehrig's record of 2130 consecutive games for the Yankees stood for 56 years – and to this day he is considered to be the greatest ever first baseman of all time. His sobriquet of "The Iron Horse", reflects not only his stamina and the evenness of his performances - but a long career bejeweled with innumerable sporting triumphs – including being the only player in US Baseball history to achieve 23 career grand slams. He seemed indestructible.

All these achievements said - Lou Gehrig's most lasting legacy belongs not to his performance on the sporting field but how he met, face to face – illness and early death.

At the close of the 1938 season – Gehrig who had indeed performed well, complained of extreme tiredness. When the 1939 season began, Gehrig, a man who had always devoted himself to rigorous training noticed that his co-ordination and stamina were failing him. As the season progressed Gehrig was yet to hit a home run – and during training collapsed. Such was his reputation for excellence and reliability that one of the great sport's reporters of the time wrote about Gehrig: "I think there is something wrong with him. Physically wrong, I mean. I don't know what it is, but I am satisfied that it goes far beyond his ball-playing. I have seen ballplayers 'go' overnight, as Gehrig seems to have done. But they were simply washed up as ballplayers. It's something deeper than that in this case, though. I have watched him very closely and this is what I have seen: I have seen him time a ball perfectly, swing on it as hard as he can, meet it squarely — and drive a soft, looping fly over the infield. In other words, for some reason that I do not know, his old power isn't there... He is meeting the ball, time after time, and it isn't going anywhere." All baseball fans knew that a man

of such integrity must be ill – but how ill was the question that remained to be answered. In tears Gehrig sat in the dugout on May the 2nd, while the Yankees played the Detroit Tigers, having proven himself unable to run to first base in a training session. His playing career with the Yankees had come to a close – after 2130 games. Now he was in a battle for his life.

Admitted to the Mayo Clinic on June the 13th, 1939, the diagnosis of Gehrig's condition, was ominous. Rejoining his Yankees in Washington DC – Gehrig arrived at the train station to be greeted by a crowd of fans and admirers. Looking at the crowd – he whispered to his travelling companions: "They're wishing me luck – and I'm dying". Dying he certainly was. Gehrig had been diagnosed with Amyotrophic lateral sclerosis, a degenerative motor neuron disease. The progression of the disease is such – that in time, the patient loses control of all voluntary movement. Gehrig, a man who epitomised robustness – and raw masculine energy – was in fact now tripping over his feet, and slowly but surely, in full view of the public was losing the famous physicality that made him a household name.

But there is much more to the Lou Gehrig story – than physical attributes. Despite his illness – Gehrig's spirit was unbroken. On July the 4th, 1939, at Yankee Stadium, Gehrig delivered one of the most memorable speeches in sporting history – a speech that has come to be known, as "The Luckiest Man on the Face of the Earth". To a packed Stadium, dressed in his Yankees kit – Gehrig after receiving many accolades, addressed the crowd: "Fans, for the past two weeks you have been reading about the bad break I got. Yet today I consider myself the luckiest man on the face of the earth. I have been in ballparks for seventeen years and have never received anything but kindness and encouragement from you fans. Look at these grand men. Which of you wouldn't consider it the highlight of his career just to associate with them for even one day? Sure, I'm lucky ... When the New York Giants, a team you would give your right arm to beat, and vice versa, sends you a gift — that's something. When everybody down to the groundskeepers and those boys in white coats remember you with trophies — that's something. When you have a wonderful mother-in-law who takes sides with you in squabbles with her own daughter —

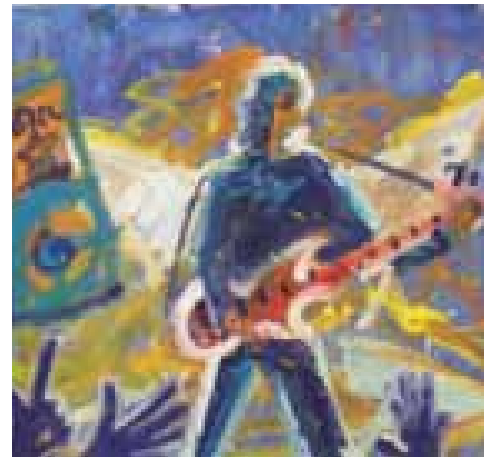
that's something. When you have a father and a mother who work all their lives so that you can have an education and build your body — it's a blessing. When you have a wife who has been a tower of strength and shown more courage than you dreamed existed — that's the finest I know. So I close in saying that I might have been given a bad break, but I've got an awful lot to live for. Thank you." Gehrig pulled himself away from the microphone – and taking out a handkerchief wiped the tears from his eyes.

Gehrig vowed to live as long as he could, and to do so as cheerfully as possible – to be an example to others of meeting ill-health with courage. On June the 2nd, 1941, a few weeks short of his 38th birthday – Lou Gehrig passed away. At his side was his wife Eleanor, who would never re-marry, and who would live the rest of her life striving to encourage research into the disease that claimed the life of her husband. Eleanor would die in 1984 – at the age of 80. The disease that claimed Gehrig – is now known by his name: Lou Gehrig's Disease. As a marque of respect the New York Yankees permanently retired Gehrig's playing number – Four.

Vince Lombardi, the great coach of the Green Bay Packers during the 1960's commented: "The quality of a person's life is in direct proportion to their commitment to excellence, regardless of their chosen field of endeavour". Lou Gehrig was a baseball legend – but long after his records are surpassed and fade from out of the annals of sports memory – he will be remembered as being that man who, when faced with the greatest challenge of all – mortality – did so in a manner in which others who witnessed his actions, understood that the human spirit remains strong and virile, even when the body is decaying and dying. In a contemporary world so caught up with glorifying the body – Gehrig reminds us that a man is still a man, even when he is no longer able to run and walk, even when everything he has is taken from him, and all that remains is a crumpled shell, containing a noble and God-given spirit.

## Honourable Mention in two categories for Dragon Down Under!

On Friday 29th October the eight Year Six boys who competed in the Write-a-book-in-a-day competition attended the presentation of awards at the Boulevard Centre in Floreat Park

Raine Bianchini, Jack Collin, Thomas Franchina, Christopher Gallen, Anthony Meo, Xavier Mitchell, Michael Radley, and Declan Tanna, were able to see all the entries in the competition and listen to the detailed feedback on the entries given by the judges. There were 101 books altogether written as Chris Oakley, who coordinates the program, said "for children, by children"

The Judge of the Primary Division, Helen Cadmus, had this to say about the books:

"Well done to every team for such fantastic results. These books contain the wonderful stuff that arises from the imaginations and hard work of groups of talented writers and illustrators committed to a common goal. Book-In-A-Day is no ordinary creative writing competition. It's the team work that makes

BIAD special, because if individuals can't work well together, respect each other's contributions, be prepared to let go of one of their own ideas in favour of someone else's, and be relied upon to do their part, then the day won't produce a successful book. And all of these books are successful: engaging storylines around believable characters pursuing some pretty far out dreams."

In awarding the Aquinas Team an Honourable Mention in the Best Book category and in the Best Illustrated section she said: "The Aquinas Redbacks produced an imaginative tale with Dragon Down Under, about a wayward, chaos-causing dragon and the heroic AI Chemist who must find the beast and restore things to right. This book is particularly well presented with lovely colour themes, cleanly edited and consistent in tone throughout the book."

Apart from seeing the other entries and hearing the feedback from the judges, the other highlight was a short address from a representative from Princess Margaret Hospital who thanked the children and their sponsors. Our boys raised their sponsorship money by making and selling cupcakes. He

told us that the money raised was going to buy some special machines which analyse the sleeping patterns of children who have problems sleeping. Without these, children have to stay in hospital for the analysis to take place. Obviously it is much better and more convenient for the children to be able to sleep at home while the tests are being carried out. He also said that the children in the hospital really enjoyed reading the books written by other children.

Write-a-Book-in-a-Day is a fundraising initiative of the Katharine Susannah Prichard Writers Centre and Princess Margaret Hospital Foundation. It is a one-day writing marathon where sponsored teams write a children's book in a day, raising funds, 40% for KSPWC and 60% for Children's Hospitals in each Australian State. Additionally a copy of each finished book is donated to the hospital library.

This is the second year we have taken part in this completion. It was a wonderful experience for all concerned. For the boys to be highly commended for their story and for their illustrations was both affirming and exciting. We will certainly be entering again next year.

# Pathways to Learning

## Exam strategies

### Types of exam questions

There are a number of standard question types that you will find in exams. Some are specific to certain subjects but others may be used across a range of subjects.

Here are some helpful hints for each question type.

### Multiple choice

- Read the question carefully (note the key words in the questions)
- Read all the choices.
- Eliminate obviously incorrect answers.
- Often the longest answer is the correct one\be careful not overlook details.
- Guess if you don't know.

### True/false

- Focus on the wording. Words such as 'always' and 'none' change the answer from wording like 'often' and 'some'.
- For something to be true all of it must be true.
- Uses the answer if you don't know. You have a 50/50 chance of succeeding.

### Short answer

- Look at the question carefully for the key words. Note the verbs (list, describe, compare) and the context (eg key elements, process, advantages etc).
- Be to the point and concise.
- Avoid over answering the question.
- If unsure use point form to record all the facts you know about the area in question.

### Matching answers

- Always read the answers column first to be aware of all the possible answers.
- Be aware that some of the answers may be 'more right' than others; don't rush.

- Eliminate answers that you think are wrong.
- Select the most appropriate answer from the remaining answers.
- Guess if you don't know.

### Filling the Gap

- Try and identify what type of word is required. Is it a verb, noun or name of something?
- Always read the whole sentence back to make sure the sentence makes sense.

(Next week we will look at essays)

### In general

- Use the reading time to get an overview of the whole exam paper.
- Scan all the questions and tick the ones you are confident you can answer.
- Underline the key words in the question and focus your attention on exactly what is being asked.
- Work out which questions you think you can answer first to give you the greatest marks.
- Divide your time proportionally between each question taking into consideration how many marks each question is worth.
- Keep your work as neat as possible.
- Leave a space between paragraphs to space out your ideas.
- Label your diagrams clearly.
- Number your answers.
- Keep quotes brief.
- Always show your working in Mathematics. Even if you get the answer wrong you may still get marks for your working out.
- Try and leave enough time to go back over your paper to ensure you have answered all questions.

### Medicine and Dentistry

Invitations to attend UWA interviews will be sent out in late November. Students are able to go on line to select an interview time of their choice in first two weeks of December. Obviously this is very much a first come first served situation. Rural applicants will receive a phone call earlier than this, so that their travel and accommodation can be organised. If students contact you about their interviews, please remember that interview coaching is NOT helpful. There is very good evidence to

show how detrimental it can be. However, there are some things you can do to assist your students. With the invitation to attend the interview, students will receive a list of the topics to be covered this year. Helping them think through what is intended would be a good starting point. Please discourage students very strongly from learning answers off by heart. Spontaneity is what will win the day, along with a thoughtful, well-reasoned and personal response. It will also be helpful if you can spend some time reminding students of the sorts of things that are important for any job interview: punctuality, good manners, neat appearance, etc. Some of your students may already have been to interviews in other States, or may have interstate interviews coming up in December/January. Please remind them that each university does it differently. They should not assume that they know it all on the basis of an interview elsewhere. There may be some late interviews in January.

### Medical Rural Bonded Scholarships.

In December, if invited for an interview, students will be able to apply for Medical Rural Bonded Scholarships. This means they must commit to 6 years in a rural/remote location. The scholarships are worth \$23,000 pa, so are an attractive incentive but students should of course consider this decision and its ramifications carefully before applying.

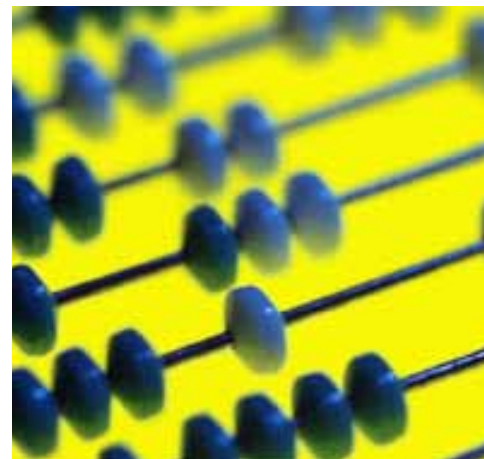

We learnt a lot and our goals were to have the right attitude before the game and simply to win every game possible. The team grew mentally and emotionally in contrast to the upcoming events which started off with two friendly matches with Santa Maria College. # Our Identity

### 22A. The Hans Arkveld Sculpture at the Front of the Gymnasium 1 (outside)

Continuing our series, looking at symbols of our identity as members of the Aquinas College community....

In a letter to Brother Dally in early December 1985, Hans Arkveld described the images in the sculpture he had completed in worked brick for the new hall and gymnasium complex at the College:

The outside wall depicts the activities of the building and reflects the history of the College and a little about the Christian Brothers.

The main group of figures relate to the building as a gymnasium, but are more than gymnasts. They represent also the precarious position of life. That's why the horizontal figure is blindfolded, a very precarious and uncertain position.

The wheels are an ongoing passage in time. Within the largest wheel is a simplified crest of the College, because from your point of view, you are in the centre and the world moves around you, as I am the centre of my world. Also within the larger wheel are the two masks representing drama, one happy and one sad.

The barred windows with the head behind are the bars behind which St Thomas Aquinas spent some years for his beliefs.



The crucified figure of Christ hangs from the Celtic Cross symbolising the origin of the Christian Brothers.

The plant from coming out of the ground growing up alongside the image of Christ is the new life through Christ.

From left to right there is a flowing band coming from the swinging figures through the wheels to the image of Christ and then visually the viewer's eyes follow this band through all the activity up through Christ to wherever we go.

The dates are historic dates of the College. On the far left are a book and a lantern symbol of learning and wisdom and of showing the way through the light. Both are symbols of St Thomas Aquinas.

The four and five were markings used when drawing up the design and therefore a part of the history of the making and a light hearted touch as are the powerpoint, frog, etc.....

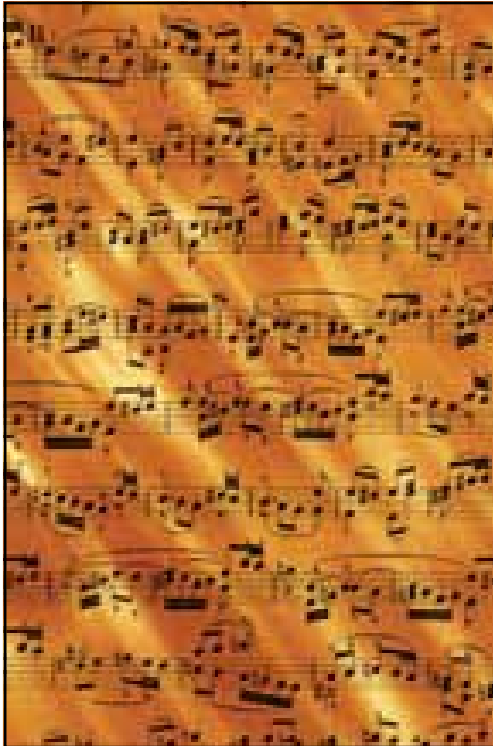

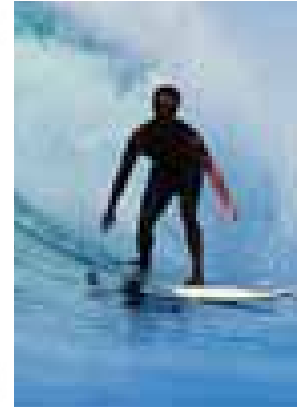
